- ♦ YPM was founded in 1922 as the Older Boys' TUXIS Parliament of Manitoba.
- YPM had female members before there were female MLAs sitting in the Manitoba Legislature.
- YPM is the longest consecutively running model parliament in the world, now in its 102nd year.
- The organization is run completely by youth under the age of 25.
- Alumni include distinguished Manitobans such as Lloyd Axworthy, Bill Blaikie, Darren Praznik and Bill Norrie.

- This year's Lieutenant-Governor is Alicia Dueck-Read.

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History of Youth Parliament

Youth Parliament of Manitoba Inc. (YPM) is a non-partisan, non-denominational corporation and registered charity. Run completely by local youth, YPM is a model parliament, a unique opportunity for young adults to improve their communication skills, learn about the Canadian democratic parliamentary tradition, and meet like-minded youth from across Manitoba.

YPM was first started in 1922 by George Stewart, Lieutenant Governor of the Older Boys' TUXIS Parliament of Manitoba. Since then, it has become the oldest mock parliament in Canada and one of the oldest of similar organizations across the world. Our aims then, as they are now, are devoted to the development of leadership and awareness of the parliamentary system among the young men (and later, women) of Manitoba.

Today, our annual Session brings together up to one hundred passionate youth from across the province who come to experience five days of debate, leadership experience, and comradeship.

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Summary of Bills

The Voters for Open and Transparent Elections Act: In response to the career politicians who dominate elected government office and strategic voting, this Act reimagines Canada's Federal Electoral System by implementing a Last-Past-the-Post vote. In this system, the candidate with the least amount of votes wins their riding. This system would dramatically change how people vote, party's methods of campaigning, and the media's influence on elections.

The Child Protection Act: This Act aims to remove the automatic assumption that a birth parent or parents of a child can properly care for that child in a way every child deserves. By requiring new parents or guardians of a child to complete a child readiness test, it is the hope of this Act that common early issues in a child's development by unfit parents or guardians can be avoided.

The Equity in Education Act: By establishing an education system based on equitable secular, intercultural and multilingual education, we can foster a society that is more tolerant and more informed about our multicultural society. This will include the transfer of all private educational institutions to the appropriate provincial education Ministry and the implementation of minority language immersion streams, including one in Indigenous languages. This bill also sets out provisions to ensure that students with disabilities or who want to enter the trades can receive the proper education they need. It establishes specialised education in trades and specialised education for students with disabilities in each school division to ensure proper education for all.
